We have built a trail bridge with the Conservation Commission, spruced up the Town beach, collected litter on Route 156, offered community education about detecting, preventing, and removing invasive species, and participated in the town's 300th celebrations. And *Third*, our protection of Pawtuckaway Lake has never been more important than now. Our milfoil infestation is almost at a tipping point. Never has our vigil in mitigating this menace been more critical. Finding and removing this invasive pest is essential. The PLIA's responsibilities are now clear. We need your support and volunteering to meet this challenge. Join with us as we march into the summer of 2022.

GOOD NEWS!

This year's Town elections gave the PLIA and the Aquatic Invasive Species Fund a boost! Thanks to member support at the Deliberative Session and good voter education, citizens in Nottingham approved a \$5,000 budget item for our Lake Host Program and an appropriation of \$10,000 to grow the Fund so it will be available in the future to help all water bodies in Town facing an invasive species crisis.

There are many ways in which the PLIA partners with the Town of Nottingham to demonstrate civic pride and participation in our community. We salute Nottingham on its 300th birthday! Here are a few examples from the past twelve months:

Building a Bridge



Last spring, members of the PLIA collaborated with the Nottingham Conservation Commission Trails Committee to build a bridge over a segment of the North River running across a trail. One of our members put together a design and list of materials for the project, another member obtained an inkind donation of the materials from Home Depot, and other PLIA members joined Trails Committee members to construct the bridge. The site was in the Marsh Woods conservation area. Hikers can walk across our handiwork! Providing Community Instruction on Aquatic Invasive Species

On April 3, 2022, the PLIA called in experts and tapped its Program Chairs to offer free Community

Workshops to anyone in Nottingham interested in protecting a local water body from invasive species. First: identifying aquatic invasive plants in or around a lake or pond. Next: inspecting boats and trailers to detect invasive "hitchhikers" before they enter a water body, plus how to clean, drain, and dry water craft to avoid the spread of these invaders. Then: how the PLIA searches for and removes milfoil, one of the most pervasive of the invasives. Finally, a complimentary pizza lunch. two annual clean-ups along a stretch of Route 156. This past year we added a third day of collecting litter and have begun recycling aluminum cans as they are discovered. 


Joining in on Nottingham 300th Birthday Events

Milfoil Status Update

The Milfoil Team was very active over the past summer, with 58 separate dives and the removal of 318 gallons of milfoil. The amount of milfoil increased substantially over 2020, when 74 gallons were removed from the lake. Two areas contributed the most to this increase: Gove's Cove, where 121 gallons were removed, and the State Park Canoe Rental area, where 65 gallons were removed. In addition, milfoil was discovered in small quantities in a number of new areas of the lake. Existing infestations appear in red, with those new areas circled, in the map below. Searches will begin with kayaks and aerial drones this spring after ice out, with diving for removal to begin sometime in May.



DID YOU KNOW? Volunteers are the backbone of our organization. They don't get paid—not because they are worthless, but because they are priceless! Last year they donated over <u>2,800 hours</u> of their time to our programs, activities, events, and mission. 
DID YOU KNOW?


The lion's share of the funds that support our programs comes from membership donations. 100% of every dollar contributed through membership is used to support the programs that help protect Pawtuckaway Lake and its watershed: Lake Hosts, Weed Watchers, Milfoil Team, Water Quality Testing, and Road Clean-Up. Everyone benefits from the work the PLIA does for the lake, so everyone should be part of it. Of the approximately 415 households on or around the lake, about 205 were PLIA members as of December 2021. That's only about 49%! You can help us boost that number!
