Last year's Annual Paddle Poker Tournament was a tremendous success, raising over \$2,200! The committee responsible for planning and executing this wildly popular fundraising event has pledged to do it

GOOD NEWS—AGAIN!

This year's Town elections gave the PLIA and the Aquatic Invasive Species Fund a green light! Thanks to member support at the Deliberative Session and good public education, voters in Nottingham approved a \$5,000 budget item for our Lake Host Program and an investment of \$10,000 in the Fund so it will be available to help all water bodies in Town facing an aquatic invasive species crisis.

Plan to Expand State Park Campgrounds

- The State Park Planning and Development Department has announced a major expansion of campsites at Pawtuckaway.
- These 35 additional sites will provide hookups for water and electricity to attract more RV campers to the Park.
- Many questions have been raised about how this expansion might impact our milfoil crisis and erosion problems.

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Milfoil Team



Bad news! While only one new area of milfoil was found in 2022 vs 2021, milfoil was still found in all the same areas as the previous year. In addition, the amount of milfoil extracted in 2022 was significantly higher (458 gallons vs 316 gallons). Gove's Cove (120 gallons), Little Cahill Cove (163 gallons), and the State Park Canoe Rental (31 gallons) are of particular concern. For the first time, we had to hire Weed Control Divers to remove milfoil several times. That gets expensive! Milfoil can grow throughout the year-even under ice-if it has sunlight. With the relatively mild winter and the very late formation of ice, we expect that milfoil will be especially prolific this year. As a result of our increasing milfoil issues, we have asked the NH DES to help us create a plan. While more needs to be done, one recommendation may be to use a herbicide in selected areas. Amy Smagula from NH DES will be speaking at the PLIA Annual Meeting and will explain the choices for milfoil control. PLEASE come and direct your questions and concerns to her for answers.

Please Respect These Flags!



When our Milfoil Team is out under the water searching for milfoil to be marked for extraction, and when our Milfoil Control Divers are down there actually extracting the milfoil, they need to be safe! Boaters who come too close to their dive sites can injure them or their equipment with their propellors, hulls, or

fishhooks. Kayak support team members protect the divers and guide boaters around the dive site. They wear orange vests and carry "Diver Down" flags. PLEASE look out for these flags. They are a WARNING to stay at least 150 feet from the dive area. If that is not possible, then you must

throttle down to headway speed and follow any directions from the support kayakers. Thank you!

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Lake Hosts

Our Lake Host Program has made some changes to allow Chair Dee Decker some breathing space from the job of running the entire enterprise almost single-handedly. Dee will continue to serve as Coordinator, supervisor, and liaison with the Town, NH LAKES, and the PLIA Board. We think this will make our Program even stronger.



On April 1, 2023. Dee and our Weed Watcher Co-Chair Steve Soreff organized a successful training, free to all comers, about recognizing-and preventing the spread of-aquatic invasive species. All members of the public were invited, because there are many local waterways to protect. The event was standing room only. This year our Lake Host Program begins on May 1st, the earliest in the state!

Water Testing

The PLIA Water Testing Program has been in existence for many decades. It is part of the Volunteer Lake Assessment Program of NH DES and it monitors the water guality of Pawtuckaway through monthly sampling and testing of the lake and its tributaries. Our team, led by Mark Wageling, is well trained and capable, out in all kinds of weather! One of the pollutants they test for is phosphorus. As these graphs illustrate, levels of phosphorus have remained fairly stable, especially in recent years.



Ice-Out Contest

Pawtuckaway State Park Expansion

On April 11, 2023, an informational meeting was convened at the Nottingham Town offices with the Director of State Parks Brian Wilson and Director of State Park Planning and Development Johanna Lyons. The topic was adding 35 "improved" campsites and other amenities to Pawtuckaway State Park, to allow stakeholders to learn more about the project and how it might affect their communities. The public was invited, 70 people attended, and the proceedings were broadcast and recorded.



After hearing from officials about the reasons for the planned expansion, members of the audience expressed concerns about the ways in which they feared it would overburden an already stressed Pawtuckaway Lake. Among those issues were milfoil spread, lakefront erosion, bacterial contamination, and loss of wildlife habitat. Your membership in the PLIA is very much appreciated and is very important. As you are no doubt aware, there has been an increase in the growth of invasive milfoil in the lake. It has spread from the South Channel and nearby coves into the State Park's canoe and kayak rental area, as well as the Town beach in the northern part of the lake. Our volunteer diver and support teams have been actively finding, marking, and removing milfoil. As a result of having fewer Weed Control Divers, we have had to pay for extraction services.

Membership over the years has been steady, and as new residents have moved in many have joined the PLIA. With approximately 400+ residences on/around the lake, about 50% of those households are members! We all have vested interests in the lake and everything that it has to offer. If you are new to the lake or if your membership has been inactive, we encourage you to join or to renew. The strength of the PLIA is our membership.
