2012 ANNUAL MEETING President's Message

This year, the Town of Nottingham has again voted to support the Lake Host Program with a \$ 4000 contribution. We are again thankful for their support. Last year 76 PLIA members voluntarily paid the higher dues levels! PLIA money combined with your generous membership contributions are enormously vital in protecting the lake from outside invasive species like exotic milfoil, zebra mussels, and the like. Take the Lake Host training if you can, it will deepen your appreciation of our backyard paradise.

This year, the main discussion for the meeting will be the Pawtuckaway Lake water Levels - NH DES hearing. At last year's meeting, Wayne Ives from the NH DES presented the Lamprey River Watershed Management Plan. He promised that , prior to any plan's acceptance by the State of NH, there would be a public hearing regarding the Impact on Pawtuckaway Lake Water Levels. The PUBLIC HEARING is scheduled for Tuesday, June 26, at 7 PM, in the sym at the Nottingham Town Hall. This will be part of a 'public comment period' similar to last year, where comments and concerns are collected. To date, the NH DES has not responded to comments, or questions, but had made some suggestions. Among the many concerns raised by Paystuchaway Residents:

- . Winter water levels would be at least two feet higher than in the past, which could damage docks and prevent shoreline cleanup.
- Summer water levels could be much lower than normal, making boating unsafe. impacting water quality, and harming loon nests.
- . The plan is theoretical, relying on untested computer models to reallocate water for downstream fish habitat and water supply
- Downstream communities (especially Durham) have not implemented mandatory water conservation measures. Go to www.nawtuckawaylake.com for the link to the Lamprey River document.

Wayne Ives, Instream Flow Program Manager for NH DES, provided the following report to the PLIA on May 11 for inclusion in the newsletter:

"DES is working through final edits and responses to comments on the Lamprey Water Management Plan. This includes final discussions with UNH-Durham Water System (UDWS) on their Conservation Plan and Water Use Plan and Durham's Wiswall Dam Management Plan. The Water Use Plan will describe operations of the water withdrawal from Wiswall Reservoir during low flow. The Dam Management Plan will describe how water must pass through the Wiswall facility during flow releases for maintaining instream flow. The revisions to the Water Quality Certification and the sub-plans under the Water Management Plan are expected to be subjects of upcoming, but as yet unscheduled, public meetings in Durham.

The Fisheries Committee has been monitoring fishing activity and issues for years, and continues to stay involved with the state and local personnel responsible for our fisheries

resources. The past season provided great fishing for all our aquatic species such as large and small mouth bass, perch, black crappie, hornpout, etc., with low pressure on the fish this winter and spring due to limited and unsafe ice, and low water. As a result, fishing should be great this year! Get out with some kids and have a ball, or eniov some quiet time for yourself. Either way, good luck and good fishing. As promised at the last PLIA annual meeting, DES has beoun the lake level investigation for the Pawtuckaway Lake annual fall drawdown and spring refill prior to adopting the Lamprey Water Management Plan, The Water Management Plan changes this drawdown from 7 feet to 4.82 feet with options for Dam Bureau to release or retain the difference in late spring based on inflow forecasting, DES will be holding a public hearing this summer as part of the lake level investigation. These activities have resulted in delaying the adoption

of the Water Management Plan (WMP). DES anticipated plan adoption in mid-summer. DES intends to begin provisions for operating the WMP as the plan is finalized

Weed Watch Report 2011

Submitted by Weed Watch Co-captains Steve Sareff & Perry Tucker Weed Watch 2011 showed persistence, commitment, and progress. We began again our survey season with a training by Amy Smagula and Therese Thompson for both Weed Watchers and Lake Hosts at the home of Peggy Tucker and Steve Soreff at 32 Dolloff Dam on Saturday May 28, 2011. The joint session

not only advanced our knowledge of exotic weeds but also promoted communication within the lake

protection initiatives We have continued the plan of assigned sections of the lake waterfront to each Weed Watcher. We added a monthly reporting system which showed the surveys

done and their findings. In 2010 the hours patrolled from June through September totalled 157 compared to 174 hours for the same duration in 2011, an increase of 10%+!

These statistics provide documentation for volunteer efforts and time to supporting agencies. Will & Sara Urban, and Gayle Williams We paid attention to all the areas of the lake where Phra have been seen and then through heroic efforts removed by hand. Rocky Cove continued to present a challenge. With the covering gone, we particularly monitored that location. A couple of Phragmites did return and these were eradicated. Several Phragmites were discovered and removed from Log Cabin Island.

Pawtuckaway Loons

The presence of loons on Pawtuckaway Lake is one of the many iovs of living here. We wake to their calls in the night, observe them fishing and preening during the day, and if we're lucky, we get to watch a young chick or two batch and grow until the fall migration

> Pawtuckaway has two main territories that are defended by pairs of loons. The dividing line is at the north end of the channels. The northern pair tends to nest in the Fundy and the southern pair has nested on many different islands in the south lake, from Loon Cove/Neal's Cove to the Rabbit Island chain between South Channel and Dolloff Dam

Nesting success is far from guaranteed, and predation is a constant concern. In 2011 the southern pair succeeded with its second nesting attempt and produced one chick right before July 4th. The chick thrived under the watchful eve of its parents and migrated in December. The same pair also succeeded in 2010 with a late July hatch that produced one chick.

continue to nest each year and incubate eggs. Last wark annual loon census on Pawtuckaway Lake counted 5 adult loons on the northern lake, including 1 adult on a nest. We also counted 2 adults and one chick on the southern lake. The extra three-some on the northern lake was probably a group of loons that were not yet of breeding age. Overall

for the state, 124 of New Hampshire's lakes were covered by 572 observers. A total of 517 adult loons were tallied, plus 13 immature loons and 91 loon chicks. Last year's chick count was almost 20% higher than in 2010, which was very good news for loon biologists.

Very soon we'll have news about this year's nests on Pawtuckaway. The pairs are together and have been exploring various island locations, so keep an eye out for them when you're on the lake. For more information about loons in New Hampshire, go to www.loon.org.
